

Best Practices for Planning a Class Reunion

Want to have a class reunion but don't know where to start? Take heart that you are in the same boat with many of your fellow Pioneers. Luckily, you have a team of people on the U-High Alumni Board's Alumni Relations Committee (ARC) that is here to help.

If you haven't already touched base with someone on the ARC, that's your first step. ARC representatives are assigned by graduation decade. See the information below for the proper contact.

After making that initial contact, you'll get some key support. First, we will help you get a copy of the most current contact list we have for your class. Second, we will begin keeping records on our end so that if another member of your class contacts us, we can put them in touch with the appropriate organizers of your reunion. It is important to note that neither U-High nor the Alumni Board has a budget to send invitations to your class members. That responsibility falls on your class itself.

So now what? Well, we've seen success happen in several ways, but the most common way people are reaching out these days is through Facebook. Many classes are forming special Facebook groups that they can then maintain even when a reunion isn't in the works.

If you're interested in doing that but don't know where to start, consult with your ARC representative (listed below). Here are some other things to consider:

- Cross-check the class contact list you receive from us with any information you have. Update both lists as necessary and send changes back to ARC so we can help maintain information on our end.
- Join the We Are One: U-High Pioneers Facebook group, and then post in the group that you are working on setting up a reunion.
- Ask for help! Form a committee of class members (four to six people) to reach out to other class members. Many are still local, but some are far away and may need plenty of time to make travel plans.
- Determine one point of contact for your class. That person should be the one who works with the ARC. That helps us maximize what we can do for you.
- Consider using an Internet-based system to share information.
 This could be a Facebook group or Google Drive. Use what feels comfortable to you.
- Determine your reunion date. Many classes are using Homecoming weekend as their go-to reunion date, but some are choosing another time of year. If you're not sure, you could use an online polling system like www.doodle.com to find out when most people in your class are available for a reunion.
- At your reunion, ask for updated contact information and share that with your ARC representative.
- Take photos and share them with us, too, so we can put them in our newsletter.

We hope you have a great experience with your reunion! And in case you haven't heard, the 2017 U-High Homecoming date is September 29.

Alumni through the decades



Corey Christenson '92 went to Augustana College after leaving U-High, where he had won an undefeated wrestling state championship at 160 pounds and was also one of the

captains of the state runner-up wrestling team as a senior. As a junior he was a state runner-up in wrestling, a state pole vault indoor champion, and state runner-up outdoor. He was also an all-conference running back and defensive back for the Pioneers and a two-time Bigger, Faster, Stronger All-American in football. He left his mark in three sports at Augustana from 1992-97, winning a total of four individual College Conference of Illinois and Wisconsin championships in track and field and wrestling and playing on teams that won three conference titles in football and wrestling. He earned five letters in track and field, where he was a five-time All-American and his 16'7" pole vault at the 1994 CCIW Championships still stands as a school record 22 years later. He was a four-year letter winner and three-year starter in football. His wrestling career, although short, was filled with success as well, winning a CCIW Championship at 158 pounds and he was also part of the team title while qualifying for the NCAA National Championships. He qualified for the NCAA National Finals in football, wrestling, and track a total of nine times.

After graduating from Augustana in 1997 with degrees in physical education and secondary education, Christenson received his master's in recreation and sports sciences from Ohio University. After teaching and coaching stints at Augustana College, as well as Moline, Seneca and Leyden high schools, he's currently at Pontiac Township High School in Pontiac where he is the head wrestling and track coach, as well as an assistant coach for the Indian football program.

Christenson and his wife Heather live in Pontiac with sons Aiden, Hunter and Cale. He serves on the executive board of the Illinois Wrestling Coaches and Officials Association and the Boys and Girls Club of Livingston County developmental board. He has also served a term on the IHSA Advisory Board for wrestling.



Katherine Steele Brokaw '98 recently published her first book, Staging Harmony: Music and Religious Change in Late Medieval and Early Modern Drama.

She is an assistant professor of English at the University of California-Merced, where she teaches medieval and renaissance literature. She attributes her success to the education she received at U-High in English, theatre and music.



One of St. Louis' favorite musical sons **Pokey LaFarge '01**recently released a new single and

video "Goodbye, Barcelona" from his latest album "Something in the Water."



University High School Alumni Joshua Phillips '02, recently published his second book Homeless: Narratives from the Streets. In the last six years, in addi-

tion to his work on the homelessness issue, Phillips received his Ph.D., began teaching at Penn State, and is now a wrestling coach at a local high school.



Graham Schenck '04 is now a Gillette speech-language pathology specialist on the Gillette craniofacial team in St. Paul, Minnesota. Schenck, as a child, had a mild

stutter and worked with a speech therapist. His experience working with a speech therapist inspired him to enter the speech-language pathology field to help others. Schenck graduated from University High School in 2004, and went on to receive his Bachelor of Science in Speech and Hearing Sciences in 2009 from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. He then went on to complete his Master of Science in Communication Sciences and Disorders in Speech-Language Pathology from Illinois State University in 2011. He just recently received his Doctor of

Philosophy in communication sciences and disorders: speech-language pathology from East Carolina University in 2016. Schenck says "I also really like working with kids. My favorite part of my job is being part of that moment when a light goes off in a kid's mind and they have a breakthrough in correcting a speech issue. It's a great experience."



Bloomington native **Gordon Vayo** (attended U-High '04-'07) did not come away from the World Series of Poker's Main Event with the championship bracelet. Instead,

he settled for more than \$4.6 million as the runner-up after the longest heads-up matchup in tournament history. Vayo, 27, is a professional poker player who attended University High School and now lives in San Francisco. He was the youngest player among the final nine.



Michelle Mora '07 obtained her M.A. from Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies and just completed her Latin American Studies Program sum-

mer internship in Lima, Peru, where she worked with the U.S. Foreign Commercial Service office at the U.S. Embassy.



In our last Pioneer, we mentioned Lance Cpl. Duncan Harris' '12 bravery in rescuing a drowning victim in July 2015 during a weekend vacation with his fam-

ily. We have since learned that Harris had the honor of being awarded the highest non-combat medal called the Navy-Marine Medal for his efforts. Commandant of the Marine Corps Gen. Robert B. Neller (member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff) flew to Honduras to present the medal to Duncan for his life-saving actions.

Sarah LaFayette was named this year's *Pantagraph* Intercity Female Soccer Player of the Year. Last season she led intercity with 56 goals—a record that only eight others in state history have beat. She has 110 career goals.

Jessica Huber was selected to be a member of the 2016 NAfME All-National Honor Ensembles Symphony Orchestra. Being selected to play in this ensemble is a reflection of Jessica's high level of dedication and skill as a viola player and correlates with her previous high placement in our District 3 IMEA Music Festival and the IMEA Honors Orchestra at All-State. Jessica traveled to Grapevine, Texas, in November to join excellent young musicians chosen from all over the U.S. to participate in the festival.

Recent graduate **Samara Ribbens** was selected to serve with the **Illinois Ambassadors of Music**. She toured Europe with the group, visiting seven countries and performing in many different venues. Their farewell concert was held on June 24 in Edwardsville.

Eight students were named Commended Students in the 2017 National Merit Scholarship Program. These scholastically talented seniors were among 34,000 Commended Students throughout the nation recognized for their exceptional academic promise. Although they did not continue in the 2017 competition for National Merit Scholarship awards, Commended Students placed among the top 5 percent of more than 1.6 million students who entered the 2017 competition by taking the 2015 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT). The eight students were: Samuel Fansler, Colin Hardman, Simon Heinrich, Jessica Huber, Matthew Messman, Emily Rodriguez, Deanna Trosino and Nicole Walker.

Mark Adams, one of U-High's speech and debate coaches and a recently retired English teacher, was honored as one of 12 people nationwide to receive a Diamond Coach Award by the National Speech and Debate Association Honor Society. This makes the second time he has received the award. Adams has coached at U-High for 10 years.

The **U-High boys' golf team won the Class 2A State Tournament** held at ISU's — Weibring Golf Club. The team finished day one in third place and surged to a first-place finish on the second day of play. This marks the **10th championship in school history and the first title since 2009**. The guys shot 308 in the second round for 624 total. Dallas Koth tied for runner-up with a 74.

The **U-High boys' soccer team** made it to the **Class 1A state tournament**. They de-

feated Waterloo Gibault 1-0 in the semifinal and came back for the finals where they beat Westchester St. Joseph 3-1 to claim the **state title**. **JD Kelley** was the first to score for the Pioneers with **Nathan Clay** scoring the next two goals. The victory brought the successful season to a great close with a **17-6-5 record and the first state title in school history**.

The **U-High boys cross country team** competed in the **Class 2A state meet** held at Peoria's Detweiller Park. The team finished in **third place** led by senior **Jack Franklin** who also claimed **third place** individually. The team had placed 10th the previous two years.

In tennis, the doubles team of **Isabel Schaefbauer** and **Abby Totten** finished in **third place** among doubles at this year's Class 1A state tournament in Buffalo Grove. Overall the Pioneers finished in ninth place with 13 points at the tournament.

The U-High Marching Pioneers ended their competition season on a high note. The State of Illinois Invitational High School Marching Band Championship was held in October at ISU where the band received First Place in Music Performance and Second Place overall in Class 1A. This year's marching band received the highest number of points of any U-High marching band at previous ISU/State competitions. In every competition this year, the Marching Pioneers placed first in at least one category.

The **Illinois High School Coaches Association** released its all-sectional soccer selections and U-High's **Nathan Clay** and **Cayden Redd** were recognized at a banquet in Elmhurst in November.

The U-High boys tennis coach, Jon Friesen, was selected by the Illinois High School Tennis Coaches Association as the 2016 Regional Coach of the Year. Friesen was honored not just for the great success he had this past spring but for the incredible improvement in his players from the beginning of the season through the state tournament. He was honored at the Awards Luncheon of the IHSTCA Workshop in early February at the Vaughan Center in Aurora.

The education-ranking firm Niche.com placed U-High as one of the top public high schools in Illinois and among the best in the nation. Under the ranking of Best Public High Schools, U-High came out as the 13th best in the state of Illinois and was ranked 56th nationally. Academic rigor accounted for half the total score in the firm's methodology. Also included are a variety of factors, including health and safety, student culture and diversity, teachers, resources and facilities, extracurricular activities, and

sports. Sports and extracurricular activities amounted to **2.5 percent each**. Schools ahead of U-High on the Illinois list are in the Chicago area. *Niche* ranks 18,793 high schools based on dozens of key statistics and over 60 million opinions from students and parents. A high ranking indicates that the school is an exceptional academic institution with a diverse set of high-achieving students who rate their experience very highly.

The following U-High musicians were selected to participate in the 2016 Illinois Music Educators Association District Festival. The festival was held in November and concluded with a concert at Olivet Nazarene University.

Senior Lake Williams was named the 2016 Mr. U-High. With everyone's help, the U-High Student Senate and U-Build Club raised over \$5,800 that will be used to help construct a home in Haiti over spring break.

Lester Hampton was inducted into the ITCCCA 2017 Hall of Fame. He has served at University High School for 29 years as head boys and girls cross country coach and head boys track & field coach. A former school record holder in the 800 meters at Illinois State, he has coached his teams to a remarkable 10 IHSA state trophies, including two state championships and coached athletes to all-state honors 78 times. Four individuals and one relay have won state titles and set two state records. Lester's teams have won 20 sectionals championships and 30 Regional titles. It is quite apparent that Lester cares



about every single one of his athletes. He is able to motivate his runners to care about each other and for parents to pour their hearts into cheering for entire teams.

Time Capsule Reinsertion 2016

Homecoming at U-High is always a spirit-filled, high-energy week of Pioneer Pride that culminates with the Alumni Awards ceremony and the Friday night football game. Homecoming 2016 had an extra event packed into the week. On September 23, before the Alumni Awards ceremony, approximately 20 guests gathered at the Gregory Street entrance. The

occasion for the gathering was to replace what was removed during Homecoming 2015. The solid copper box that was inserted in 1965, and removed in 2015, was used again to keep the treasures safe for another 50 years.

Contents included play bills, musical and theatre programs, Clarion yearbooks 2015 and 2016, Life in the Lab Schools, Brome and Beyond 2015 and 2016, a Student Planner and School Handbook, Teacher Master Schedule 2015-2016, U-High lapel pin and key chain, the list of items from the original time capsule of 1965, the letter from the class of 1965 to the class of 2065, a new letter from the senate and class of 2016 to the class of 2065, fun cultural/social items such as Pokémon cards and a "Hamilton" issue of Rolling Stone Magazine. Given the pristine condition the items of 1965 were in when the box was opened in 2015, the students of 2065 should find a treasure trove of information to allow them to learn about our students and community. On hand for the reinsertion were Superintendent of Lab Schools Jeff Hill, Principal Andrea Market and Student Senate President Nia Gilbert, along with faculty and staff members. What made the event truly special was the participation of John Wroan, class of '45. Wroan was the building contractor of the school and originally inserted the time capsule in 1965 with auditorium namesake Ruth Stroud.

Distinguished Alumni Award **Judy Greenes Regnier '58**



The University High School Alumni Association honors Judy Greeness Regnier, class of 1958, as the 2016 Distinguished Alumni Award recipient for her contributions to

her profession and civic service. Regnier has had a widely varied life, and nearly all her experiences have helped improve others' lives in some way. She has been the first female computer programmer at two companies, a wife and mother, an interior designer, a registered nurse, a speaker/volunteer for Donate Life California, and a watercolor artist. Regnier is also a liver transplant recipient and breast cancer survivor.

Regnier participated in a variety of school activities and earned numerous distinctions: National Honor Society, Student Council secretary, class officer, cheerleader, Thespians, Clarion staff, academic clubs, and Homecoming queen. After graduation, she attended Northern Illinois University for two years, was chosen to be a CWENS honor society member her sophomore year, and was a proud member of Sigma Kappa sorority. She then continued her education at Illinois State University while she worked as a computer programmer. Regnier later was active as a Sigma Kappa Alumnae Advisor at Purdue University, while living in Lafayette, IN.

It was during her nursing career that Regnier contracted Hepatitis C while working in intensive care, which she was completely unaware of until she developed symptoms 20 years later. As a result, she was told she was terminal unless she received a liver transplant. Luckily, on Mother's Day 1998, Regnier received the gift of life through organ donation from an anonymous family. This second chance on life is what fueled Regnier to help impact others' lives by becoming an active speaker and volunteer for the Donate Life California organization and assisting with registration of other potential organ donors. Regnier and her husband, Ken, were married in 1995, and together have three children and seven grandchildren. Her other hobbies include music, local dramatic productions, reading books, travel, fishing, and golf.

leadership qualities and takes pride in having a positive impact on the lives of others. In addition to his career accomplishments and other personal awards, Zimmerman also received the Military Outstanding Volunteer Service Medal for various community service efforts during his Naval service. In his spare time, Zimmerman also enjoys running, where he was a silver medalist in the 3K and bronze medalist in the mile at the 2013 USA Masters Indoor Track and Field Championships. Hall of Fame Alumni Award Karl Eigsti '56

to his profession and civic service. Eigsti enjoyed participating in the following school events: Thespians, Debate Team, basketball, and state dramatic reading. After high school, Eigsti attended Indiana University and American University (Washington D.C.), where he obtained his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1962. He was a recipient of the prestigious Fulbright Scholarship to England that same year, and later went on to earn a master's in theatre from the University of Bristol (England) in 1964. During his career, Eigsti has worked as a designer in the American theater for five decades. After spending two years on a Fulbright Scholarship to England, he returned to America in 1964 and become resident designer at The Arena Stage in Washington D.C.

Eigsti has designed 20 productions on Broadway and numerous plays off-Broadway that include: the original productions of Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, Arthur Miller's American Clock, John Guare's House of Blue Leaves, Athol Fugard's Boesman and Lena, and Isaac Basheva Singer's Yentl. He was nominated for a Tony Award for his designs for Knockout on Broadway, for which he also won the

Joseph Maharam Award. Eigsti is currently a voter for the Tony Awards.

Throughout his design career, Eigsti has taught in graduate programs throughout the country. He was appointed as adjunct to the design faculty of The NYU School of The Arts at its inception, and continued teaching there for 19 years. Eigsti left to become head of the Graduate Design Program at Brandeis University, a position he held for 21 years. At Brandeis, he was awarded the Leonard Bernstein Creative Arts Award for significant contributions to the Arts at Brandeis. Eigsti was promoted to professor emeritus at the presentation of the award. After his tenure at Brandeis, he was appointed The Visiting Professor of Theater Design at Ohio University and taught in that capacity for two years. Eigsti has been married to Amela since 2006. He has one son, Chris.

Hall of Fame Award Melissa Alyson Smith '02

Smith participated in a variety of school activities and earned numerous distinctions: National Honor Society, Mu Alpha Theta, WYSE Academic Challenge for three years (numerous individual medals on regional, section, and state level in chemistry, physics, and computer-aided drafting), and varsity track and field during her junior/ senior years. She attended the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, where she posted a 3.72 GPA with honors and earned a Bachelor of Science degree in materials science and engineering in 2006. Smith went on to earn a Doctorate in Philosophy, materials science, and engineering from the prestigious Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) in 2012.

She is a technical staff member in the chemical, microsystem, and nanoscale technologies group at MIT Lincoln Laboratory, where she is exploring new methods and strategies to build integrated microfabricated devices that are highly scalable. She

has enjoyed publishing and presenting her work, which includes a paper as first author and two conference presentations on devices for high-voltage systems on flexible substrates. She holds numerous awards and distinctions, and has been the inventor or co-inventor of five filed patents and several other intellectual property disclosures. While at IBM, she earned a First Plateau Invention Achievement Award and a First Platent Application Award.

Smith has also demonstrated great leadership and service in community activities. During her time with IBM, she served as a mentor for both the Pathways in Technology Early College High School (P-TECH) program and the MindsMatterNYV program (high school sophomores/juniors). Through her dedication to these programs, Smith has been able to encourage, prepare, and support motivated high school students from low-income families in the achievement of their college aspirations.
