The halls of U-High were decorated, everyone in the school was in green and gold, and University High School's 2017 Homecoming had one of the largest turnouts in the school's history. In addition to many other alumni, the classes of 1957, 1967, and 1972 all gathered that weekend and made this one a Homecoming to remember.

The tailgating Friday afternoon at Horton attracted hundreds of U-High Alumni and friends. That evening, U-High's football team took on the Jacksonville Crimson, and the Pioneers came out with a victory with a final score of 38-20. Even the Saturday morning tour of University High School, given by Interim Superintendent Ty Wolf and Athletic Director Wendy Smith, attracted around 60 alumni. Our alumni participated in every aspect of Homecoming this year. Thank you all for coming out and celebrating with us!

Additionally, this year's Alumni Awards went to some very prestigious alumni. Jim Scott received the Friends of U-High Award, while Audrey Brust Naffziger '45 received the Alumni Service Award. There were three recipients of the Pioneer Hall

of Fame Award: Andrew Thomas Golomb '97, Erin McCarney Lunceford '79, and Lynn Thomsen '83. This year's Distinguished Alumni Award went to Bardwell F. White '60. Mr. White currently resides in Florida and was unable to attend due to the hurricane that hit Florida at the time of Homecoming. Congratulations to all our 2017 Alumni Award winners. The award recipient biographies are as follows.

Alumni Award Recipients 2017:

Bardwell F. White, recipient of the Distinguished Alumni Award, graduated from University High School in 1960 and went on to obtain his Bachelor of Arts degree from Parsons College in 1964. White later earned his master's degree in computer science from Southern Illinois University, where he was the first graduate of the computer science program in 1967. He has enjoyed a very successful 50-plus year career in the information technology arena and is currently president (founder) of the Whitecrest IT Consulting Group. Prior to his current role, White was also the chief information officer (CIO) for several worldwide manufacturing companies including Spalding Sports Worldwide, Pioneer Valley Transit, and Rexam Graphics. In 1995, he was named worldwide CIO of the Year by Bull Inc. To help out in the community, White volunteers his time teaching weekends at a supermax prison and weeknights in four other area prisons. In addition, White also enjoys being a Holocaust researcher and is currently writing a book on some of the unique acts of individual bravery in World War II concentration camps and federal prisons.

Andrew Thomas Golomb, recipient of the Pioneer Hall of Fame Award, graduated in 1997 from University High School and went on to obtain his Bachelor of Science degree in 2001 from Butler University. He later went on to earn his Master of Business Administration from the prestigious University of Chicago, Booth School of Business, where he was named to the Dean's List (Top 15 percent of class). Golomb has advanced quickly in the investments field and is currently a director for Bank of America Merrill Lynch in the Global Principal Investment Area. He also serves on 15 corporate boards including BIDS, Curve Global, TIM Group, Porter Group, Finacity, Business Lenders, and Resort Funding. Golomb impacted his community by founding the Merrill Lynch/Joseph Stockton Chicago Public School Mentoring Program for mentoring third-graders at an inner-city Chicago public school. His efforts led to Merrill Lynch being recognized as an official partner of the Chicago Public School System.

Fitzgerald was the guest on Alumni Day and attended a reception with other distinguished alumni hosted by the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences and a luncheon honoring all university-wide alumni. Fitzgerald was then invited to do a presentation on his experiences as a Fulbright Scholar.

Forty-one years later, the two Pioneers currently work together at the Nord-Milligan Dental Center on Eastland Drive. Nord first met Milligan while she was a student at Illinois Wesleyan job shadowing him as she was considering dentistry as a career. She went on to work for him as an assistant for a summer. "Dr. Milligan had been an invaluable mentor to me before and during my years at dental school. I continue to learn new things from him every day. We share the same ethics and values and for that I feel extremely lucky to have joined his team," writes Nord. She graduated from Southern Illinois School of Dental Medicine in June, 2017.

In the halls of U-High

A U-High graduate **Sarah LaFayette** was named *The Pantagraph* **Soccer Player of the Year.** She led the Pioneers to a second-place finish in the Class 1A state tournament and was also the third leading scorer in state history, scoring 178 career goals along with contributing 53 assists.

U-High was well represented at this year's National Speech and Debate Tournament in Alabama. James Han brought home a first-place finish in extemporaneous commentary at the event. Caroline Pickering and Natalie Thomison finished in second and fourth place respectively in expository speaking. U-High had an additional two students finish in the top 60 and four were semifinalists. The Pioneers were represented by a record 16 students who attended the tournament, which involved more than 1,100 schools.

The National Speech and Debate Association named recent graduates Colin Hardman, Justin Maaks, Alex Plumadore, and Austin Spaulding academic All-Americans. This coveted award recognizes academic rigor, competitive success, and personal excellence. Less than 500 out of 141,000 students earn this award each year. This accomplishment places these students among the top half of 1 percent of all student-members across the country.

In July, students from U-High and the area competed in the **Annual National NAACP ACT-SO** Competition in Baltimore. They competed along with 700 talented youth from across the U.S. U-High senior **Jordyn Blythe** brought home a **gold medal in oratory speaking.**

Faculty Associate Shannon Maney-Magnuson was recognized by the Yale Office of Undergraduate Admissions as a recipient of the 2017 Yale Educator Award. The Yale Educator Recognition Program recognizes outstanding educators from around the world who support and inspire their students to perform at high levels and to achieve excellence. Of this year's 411 nominees, representing 42 U.S. states and 24 countries, 58 teachers and 30 counselors were selected to receive the award. Matriculating students are invited to nominate high school educators, and a committee of Yale admissions officers reviews each nomination individually and designates recipients.

Ten U-High students were named Commended Students in the 2018 National Merit Scholarship Program. These scholastically talented seniors are among about 34,000 Commended Students throughout the nation being recognized for their exceptional academic promise. Commended Students placed among the top 5 percent of more than 1.6 million students who entered the 2018 competition by taking the 2016 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. The Commended Students were: Vishvarath Balasubramanian-Karthikeyan, Lauren Dubravec, Joshua Friesen, Tanner Gillam, Rohan Kamatar, Alexander Keene, Joshua Lewis, Daniel Ray, Anna Tulley, and Montgomery Winslow.

The following students were named to this year's Homecoming Court: Jordyn Blythe, Molly Day, Elyse Schoenig, Kimmy Sendelbach, Lexus Tennison, Cassie Trosino, Chris Cuppini, Doug Holmes, Josh Kuhn, Kee Randolph, Mark Widdel, and Ty Ziebarth. At Homecoming, Kuhn and Blythe were crowned King and Queen.

The U-High boys golf team finished in third place at the Class 2A state golf tournament held at Weibring Golf Club. The team was led by Dallas Koth who shot a 141 total and finished in second place individually. The other Pioneers on the course finished as follows: Ethan Huynh (156); Brevin Knight (159); Alex Kullman (159); Tony Palumbo (164); and Ben Bazan (171).

The U-High girls golf team finished this year's Class 2A girls state golf tournament in 10th place. The tournament was held in Forsyth at Hickory Point Golf Course. Maddison Murphy led the Pioneers and posted a 7-over par 79 on the second day of the tournament. Overall scores were as follows: Lexi Onsrud (166); Jadyn Spinks (166); Jaiden Mapugay (172); Olivia Graham (180); and Abby Klein (199).

Boys soccer coach Jeremy Stanton was selected to receive the 2016-2017

NFHS Soccer Coach of the Year Award.

The selection to receive this prestigious honor is based on the positive work Coach Stanton has done with the athletes in our program. IHSA Sports administrative staff selected a coach from each of their sports

and submitted Coach Stanton's name to the National Federation of State High School Associations, which sponsors the award. Coach Stanton and his staff lead a successful soccer program having won numerous regional, sectional, and supersectional victories, along with winning the state championship last year.

U-High had four players in this year's state tennis tournament. **Abby Totten** made it through the consolation third round. She ended the season with a 32-8 record. **Amaya Fernandes** lost in the consolation third round with a 34-8 record. The doubles team of **Grace Matheis and Anna Huber** made it to the consolation quarterfinals. They went 3-2 in the tournament and 35-9 overall. U-High ended the tournament with 12 points to tie for seventh place.

Wendy's recently recognized Jared Schuckman as a state finalist and the school winner of the High School Heisman Award. This award goes to a high character student-athlete who has displayed excellence and integrity both on and off the field. For this student, taking the easy way out or cutting corners aren't options, and Wendy's is proud to honor their dedication. Like the Heisman Memorial Trophy, Wendy's believes in the pursuit of athletic and academic excellence with integrity. Since 1994, Wendy's and the Heisman Trophy Trust have been running the same play to perfection: honoring more than 600,000 of the nation's most esteemed students. The Wendy's High School Heisman was created by Wendy's founder Dave Thomas in 1994.

Stephanie Chow was selected for the 2017 Eastern Illinois University Honors Jazz Combo after auditioning amongst a record number of talented high school musicians across the state. She performed with the EIU Honors Jazz Combo in a concert in November at the EIU Black Box Theatre.

Lisa Tabaka, U-High's visionimpaired faculty associate, was awarded the Teaching Excellence Award by the National Federation of the Blind of Illinois. She received her award at the group's annual convention in October. Tabaka is a graduate of Illinois State University, and she has taught visually impaired students at all grade levels during her 10 years with the Lab Schools. She has a strong commitment to her students and their success. She is also a great mentor to other college students following her example as they work with the visually impaired.

The following U-High musicians were chosen to participate in the 2017 Illinois Music Educators Association District Jazz Festival. Jazz Band: Stephanie Chow, Lila Rolon, Tom Scott, Bennett Sinclair, and Daniel Winger. Jazz Choir: Jonathan Boudreaux, Josh Kuhn, Abby Naden, Gabe Pfister, and Daniel Ray. The festival was held in November and concluded with a concert at Olivet Nazarene University.

U-High cross country represented
U-High well at the state meet at Peoria's
Detweiller Park. The boys team finished in
second place. The team was led by Jared
Schuckman who finished in eighth place

individually. Lyndsey Wolters, the lone female runner for U-High, finished in an impressive sixth place. Jared was joined by fellow teammates Jackson McClure (27th), Matt Zacharias (36th), Dane Alexander (51st), Harris Porter (55th), Sean Supan (90th), and Tanner Gillam (124th).

The U-High volleyball team captured third place at the Class 3A state tournament this year. The team lost to Althoff Catholic in the opening round but came back and beat St. Viator 25-21, 19-25, 25-19. This was the sixth state trophy in school history and the first since 2000. Jessica McDowell had 12 digs, and Amber Juarez had 11 digs. Isabel Schaefbauer had 11 kills, 14 assists, and 8 digs. Addy Loeffler had 11 kills, and Alexis Engst contributed 17 assists.

Kee Randolph was crowned 2017 Mr.

U-High. He and other 11 contestants helped members of the Student Senate and U-Build Club bring in over \$4,200 for the construction of a home in Haiti.

Just before Thanksgiving, the **U-High girls swim and dive team** participated in the state meet. U-High's **Dana Siverly** finished in fourth place in diving with 418.25 points! She placed the highest ever by an area diver. Overall, the team tied for 26th place out of 42 teams participating.

Nathan Clay of the U-High boys soccer team was selected for All-State Honors by the Illinois High School Soccer Coaches Association. Receiving all-sectional recognition were U-High's JD Kelley, Christian Lopez, and Cayden Redd. The student-athletes were honored at a banquet in November in Elmhurst.

The Washington Post released its 2017 rankings of

America's Most Challenging High Schools. Out of 22,000

high schools, U-High was ranked 1,546th, making it

among the top 7 percent in the nation. The rankings take

into account the number of college-level tests given at school

the previous year divided by the number of graduates.

Ruth Farnham Kapes '34—101 years young!

For many U-High alums, newsworthy events during four years of high school may include Presidential elections, the winner of the World Series or the Super Bowl, popular movies, or music. Many of these events may or may not become true historical reference points that remain in our collective memory. For one U-High alum, her four years at U-High were filled with events that we can all agree were truly historic. Franklin D. Roosevelt was President of the United States and gave the very first televised speech. Alcatraz opened in 1934, a gallon of gas was \$0.10, and the Golden Gate Bridge construction began in 1933. All of these events happened during the time period of 1931-1934 when Ruth (Farnham) Kapes was a student at U-High, graduating in 1934. For those of you doing the math, yes, Ruth is 101 years young! As far as I can tell, she is our oldest U-High alum.

I had the honor and privilege of recently meeting with Ruth, who still resides in Illinois. I was able to show her the yearbooks from her time at U-High, and she fondly recalled many friends, events, and activities as if they were yesterday. She and her siblings attended Metcalf and U-High from K-12th grade and were friends with students in the Mercier and Fairchild families—names closely associated with U-

High and ISU. Ruth confirmed firsthand that most students were afraid of Thomas "Ziggy" Barger, grandfather of U-High alums Carter ('61) and Thomas Barger III ('58). She also recalled that Ruth Stroud, as a new teacher, was a stickler for making sure all students used proper grammar and English. Much like today, Ruth and her classmates were involved in many activities and sports, including Orchesis, Glee Club, Thalian (girl's debate club) and the drama club, Tic, Toc. All U-High classes were held on the main campus of ISNU with dances held in Cook Hall, known then and now as "The Castle."

U-High faculty consisted of 12 teachers, and the concept of the "Home Room System" was introduced as an experiment Ruth's senior year of 1934. There were 56 seniors in 1934, and Ruth kept in touch with many of her classmates over the years. All students went home for lunch, as there was no lunchroom, and the school day was from 8 a.m. to 3:50 p.m. When I shared with Ruth how many applications U-High receives each year for admission, she laughed at that notion. When she and her siblings were students in the Lab Schools, some families made the decision not to send their children there as some parents were not so confident in the abilities of the student teachers and newly hired teachers. Ruth graduated from college and raised her family in the Chicago suburbs but maintained many relationships with friends who lived in the Bloomington/Normal area.

Ruth and her sister Joan (class of '42), who lives in California, have followed U-High through the years by reading *The* Pioneer. She enjoys reading about the successes of our students and how prepared our students are when they graduate from U-High. Ruth is a proud Pioneer and supports U-High through annual gifts and recently shared her generosity through a gift toward our air conditioning fund for the gym. Ruth is a special alum in so many ways, and she is extremely proud to say she is from U-High, and it has truly upheld her through the years.

Erin (McCarney) Lunceford, recipient of the Pioneer Hall of Fame Award, graduated in 1979 from University High School. She obtained her Bachelor of Arts degree in economics, cum laude, from the University of Colorado Boulder in 1983. Lunceford later went on to earn her juris doctor at the University of Houston in 1988. She has enjoyed a very successful career in both the legal and judicial fields for over 25 years and is currently practicing law as counsel for Norton Rose Fulbright. In 2015, Lunceford was appointed by Texas Gov. Greg Abbott to become Judge of the 61st Civil District Court in Harris County, Texas. In addition, she was recognized as one of the Top Attorneys in Texas by Texas Monthly for 2011-2015 and selected as a Texas Super Lawyer from 2008-2015. In 2011, Lunceford was also selected as one of 20 Winning Women Lawyers in Texas. Lunceford has impacted her community through her service as a PTO president, San Jacinto Girl Scouts service unit manager and troop leader, and as a Sunday school teacher.

Lynn Thomsen, recipient of the Pioneer Hall of Fame Award, graduated from University High School in 1983. After high school, he attended Augustana College,

where he obtained his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1987. At Augustana, Thomsen excelled as a leader on the football field. He set a record that no one else in college football has ever matched, as he started 50 games and was never on the losing side (ending with a record of 49-0-1). Thomsen played defensive tackle and helped win four straight national title championships in NCAA Division III Football from 1983-1986. He was named an All-American in his division in 1985 and 1986, was named Defensive Player of the Year in the College Conference of Illinois and Wisconsin in 1986, and was a three-time all-conference choice. One of Thomsen's proudest achievements was being inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1997. He currently works as an underwriting operations manager at State Farm and has provided community service by chairing four United Way Campaigns in Illinois and Florida.

Audrey (Brust) Naffziger, recipient of the Alumni Service Award, graduated in 1945 from University High School. She was the very first Homecoming Queen crowned at U-High. Naffziger has been an active member of the University High School Alumni Association Board and a proud participant and supporter of the U-High Boost-

ers Program. In addition, she has made numerous contributions to the U-High Library. Naffziger was also a home economics teacher at Metcalf from 1972 through 1982, until she retired. At Metcalf, she created the school lunch program and ran the cafeteria. In addition, Naffziger donated the butterfly garden and numerous items for playground structures at Metcalf and has spent many hours maintaining the garden.

Jim Scott, recipient of the Friends of U-High Award, became a member of the University High School family in 1957 when he was first hired as a teacher and coach. During his tenure at U-High, Scott had many great accomplishments. He started the health program at U-High and taught those classes until he retired. Scott also started the girls swim program and the boys and girls golf programs. He also served as head baseball coach at U-High for over 40 years. Scott was elected as a state representative for the Illinois High School Baseball Association during his baseball coaching years. He has also found time to give back to the community over the years by serving on several community organization groups, such as the Optimist Club and the Sister Cities Program.
