

Lane Howard: film industry dream becomes realty for this alum

Have you seen any of Hollywood's movie blockbusters lately? 1989 alumni Lane Howard is a part of the exciting movie industry. This talented Pioneer works for Industrial Light & Magic (ILM) in Vancouver, Canada. ILM was founded in 1977 by George Lucas as the visual effects studio to help create *Star Wars*. His current role at ILM is managing teams of visual effects artists. His most recent works include *Star Wars: The Last Jedi, Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom, Aquaman*, and currently *Captain Marvel*.

"I grew up on a steady diet of comic books, cartoons, art, and movies," he said. "My parents always encouraged and supported my passion for art, animation, and film. While I was incredibly fortunate to have this kind of support, the film and animation industry seemed so far away, almost mythological.

"A pivotal moment for me was seeing *Star Wars* at a drive-in theater as a child. Enamored with the adventure and storytelling, my perspective on movies and what they could be was altered forever which would inspire me to this day."

The liberal arts and university-preparatory approach at U-High afforded Howard the freedom to explore different interests and passions and certainly opened his mind to different potential career possibilities. He focused heavily in art, taking AP art courses and assembling a portfolio for entry into an art and design college program. Although he didn't pursue art in college, this passion certainly influenced Howard in film and visual effects. He graduated from Illinois State University with a B.S. in anthropology, with a focus in archaeology. After moving to Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, he studied visual effects and animation at Vancouver Film School. Living in Vancouver and realizing that there was a viable film industry, Howard's dream that seemed so distant came full circle into a realistic goal to pursue. After graduation he went on to work at Zoic Studios in visual effects for television and smaller feature films. Howard enjoys living and working in Vancouver.

"In Vancouver and British Columbia, I'm incredibly fortunate to have access to the city and the mountains and ocean, which gives me the opportunity to ski in the winter and experience the ocean and explore the mountains in the summer," he said.

"The friendships that I forged at U-High still carry on today. Those friendships continue to inspire, encourage, and support me as they have through my teenage years and adult life," he said. "It's a privileged position to be in to be able to 'follow your passion.' So, if you are afforded that option, don't squander it. The road toward work that you're passionate about is rarely smooth or direct. Keep your goal in sight, take advantage of opportunities when you find them, and be kind to people along the way."

In the halls of U-High

The U-High Speech and Debate Team traveled to Fort Lauderdale, Florida, in June for the National Tournament. The team's performance was the most successful team result in Pioneer history. U-High was named a School of Excellence by placing in the Top 20 out of more than 1,300 participating schools. James Han finished in third place in International Extemporaneous Speaking. Adding to the team result was Catherine Winger in fourth place and Natalie Thomison as a semifinalist in Expository Speaking, Jordyn Blythe as a semifinalist in Dramatic Interpretation, and Lauren Dubravec who made it to the Top 30 in Informative Speaking.

The Marching Pioneers took first place in Class 1A at the ISU State of Illinois Invitational and competed in the evening finals competition for the first time in school history, taking 13th out of the 15 finalist bands. The Marching Pioneers also took second in Class 3A and second overall in the small schools division at the Illinois Marching Band Championships at the University of Illinois in the afternoon between the ISU prelims and finals performances. The Marching Pioneers ended the season by competing alongside some of the best bands in the nation at the Bands of America St. Louis Super Regional at the Dome at America's Center. The band earned first place in Class 1A sweeping all caption awards, including Outstanding Music Performance, Outstanding Visual Performance, and

Outstanding General Effect.

The U-High girls tennis team brought home trophies from the 47th annual girls state tennis tournament in Class 1A. McKenna Schaefbauer remained undefeated and became the third intercity girls player to win the singles title. She led the team to a third-place finish with 18 points. Abby Totten went 28-6 after an 8-1 consolation fourth-round loss and 3-2 in the tournament.

The following U-High musicians were selected by audition for the ILMEA District III Jazz Ensembles. These students participated in the District Jazz Festival in November at Olivet Nazarene University, which concluded with a concert at ONU. 

Ella Bittner led the team finishing in 11th place and also earned All-State honors. She was joined by Mackie Madix in 30th, Lizzy Zacharias in 75th, Britany Ziemer in 86th, and Kendy Ummel in 93rd.

Hesse participated in a variety of school activities and earned numerous distinctions at U-High: National Honor Society, International Thespian Society, Student Senate Officer, Brome and Beyond Editor, Varsity Swim Team, and Madrigals.

After graduation, she attended Bryn Mawr College, where she earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree in English, Summa Cum Laude, in 2003. During her time at Bryn Mawr, she also earned the Andrew Keen Journalism Award and the Harris Wofford Fellow. Hesse later went on to earn her master's degree in nonfiction writing, as an Outstanding Graduate, from Johns Hopkins University in 2008.

Hesse prides herself on hard work and dedication and has accomplished a great deal throughout her young career. She is currently a columnist at The Washington Post. In this role, Hesse has written narrative stories on topics from gender and class to politics and popular culture. In addition, she has covered events ranging from White House State Dinners and political campaigns to the Academy Awards. Hesse is also an accomplished author, and has written five books, two of which were National Best Sellers-Girl in the Blue Coat and American Fire.

DAVID LITTLE '85

The University High School Alumni Association honors David Little, class of 1985, as a 2018 Hall of Fame Alumni Award

Recipient for his contributions to his profession, athletic career, and civic service.

Little was raised the son of a prominent local veterinary family in Bloomington/Normal, born to Bruce and Nancy Little. Following in the footsteps of his sister, Libby, and brother, Tom, he attended Metcalf Elementary and University High Schools from K-12.

At U-High, Little's passion became athletics, where he earned nine varsity letters in total: track (4); football (3); and basketball (2). Little stood out in football, earning All-City and All-Conference honors beginning his sophomore year. In addition, he received WJBC Player of the Week recognition and was voted Most Valuable Player by his teammates and coaches in his senior season. One of his biggest accomplishments that year was being recognized with the Army Reserve Scholar/Athlete award.

After high school, Little first attended Iowa State University, where he played one year of varsity football. He then transferred to Indiana University (IU), where he played four years under College Hall of Fame coach Bill Mallory. During his time at IU, the Hoosiers were invited to three post-season bowl games: the All-American Bowl vs. Florida State University (1986); the Peach Bowl vs. University of Tennessee (1987); and the Liberty Bowl vs. South Carolina (1988). During the 1988 season,

the Hoosiers climbed the national rankings to No. 2 but were defeated by Michigan State University for the Big 10 championship, thus ending their hope for a Rose Bowl bid. During his time at IU, Little was named to the IU Athletic/Academic Honor Roll eight out of eight semesters and received a degree in sports marketing and management.

After college, Little moved to Honolulu and married Stacey Archer in December 1990. While in Honolulu, Little helped build a successful construction and landscaping business with his brother-in-law, and together with his choreographer/dancer wife, also created a not-for-profit organization that brought low-cost dance programs to remote areas of Oahu. In addition, they also provided dance programs to low-income housing funded through the Hawaii "DARE" initiative. Over the course of the next nine years in Hawaii, the Littles welcomed their three children to the world: Trey, Haley, and Travis.

In 1999, Little and his family made a trip to Bolingbrook, where he took a position with the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) as director of conventions and meetings. In this position, he assisted in the planning and coordination of the AVMA Annual Convention, which attracts over 10,000 attendees annually for veterinary continuing education.

Little was then recruited and hired as the assistant CEO of the Western Veterinary Conference (WVC) in Las Vegas in 2009. In this new position, he was challenged with opening a first-of-its-kind, state-of-the-art, medical education facility, which provides hands-on training to over 45,000 veterinary and human medical professionals from around the world. In addition to its educational facility, WVC also produces an annual veterinary conference attracting over 14,000 attendees each year. In 2013, Little was promoted to the position of CEO and is currently charged with oversight and direction of this \$20 million, 501c(3), not-for-profit organization.

Taulbee enjoyed both his academic and extracurricular activities at U-High.

After high school, Taulbee attended Illinois Wesleyan University (IWU), where he obtained his Bachelor of Arts in 1972. He later went on to earn his medical doctorate degree from the Medical College of Wisconsin in 1976. In addition, Taulbee completed an internship at Marshfield Clinic in 1977 and his dermatology residency at the University of Wisconsin–Madison in 1980.

For almost 40 years, Taulbee has made his mark on the local Bloomington-Normal community by owning a successful medical practice as a board-certified dermatologist. He has served as a member of both the American Academy of Dermatology and the McLean County Medical Society, representing the county at the state medical society level. In addition, Taulbee often lectures about his specialty to local groups and ISU classes.

Taulbee has demonstrated leadership and service in community activities. He has volunteered his time as a soloist, choir member, and Sunday school teacher at his church. In addition, Taulbee has actively supported Metcalf and U-High through the years.

Taulbee is married to Sue, whom he met at IWU. They enjoy spending time together, and she serves as the office manager in his medical practice. They have two daughters, Ann and Claire, who also graduated from U-High.

With a very successful career of over 35-plus years in the accounting field, Mittelstaedt is recognized for his significant

professional accomplishments and overall contributions to his community.

Mittelstaedt displayed an early interest in his English, math, and accounting classes at U-High. He credited the teachers for having a free exchange of ideas in these courses, where they encouraged the students to make creative linkages between seemingly disparate stories, movies, or events, a valuable skill in his later endeavors. During his years at U-High, Mittelstaedt also maintained a high GPA and made the National Honor Society, while earning a varsity letter for baseball.

After high school, Mittelstaedt attended Illinois State University, where he obtained both bachelor's (with high honors) and master's degrees in accounting, in 1979 and 1982 respectively. He later went on to earn a doctorate in accounting from the University of Illinois in 1987.

Mittelstaedt is currently the Department of Accountancy Chair at the University of Notre Dame, where his department has attained extremely high national rankings. For his contributions, Mittelstaedt has received numerous professional awards, such as the Deloitte Foundation Professor of Accountancy, the PricewaterhouseCoopers Faculty Fellow, and the Executive MBA Outstanding Teacher Award (to name just a few). Prior to his time at the university, Mittelstaedt also worked in the field of public accounting at both Guthoff & Co. and PriceWaterhouse. One of his most honored accomplishments was earning the Elijah Watts Sells Award for his CPA Exam performance. The award was given to only the 95 candidates with the highest scores out of 57,000 candidates nationwide.

In addition to his career, Mittelstaedt has also demonstrated great leadership and service to his community. He has dedicated a significant amount of time by serving on boards and committees, such as the Federation of Schools of Accountancy. He has also produced many informative publications and texts and was also called upon by Congress to testify on the topic of retiree health benefits due to his significant expertise in the field. In addition, he was co-author of Financial Reporting & Analysis (4th to 7th editions).

Mittelstaedt is definitely proud to be a member of the U-High family, as his brother, uncle, and two cousins also attended the school.

I know that he truly loved and found happiness in treating people, especially those who were desperate for help and unable to pay. I think this is why he loved going to Haiti so much.

When I first joined the practice, I was heavily in debt and new to private practice oral surgery, Steve offered this advice that will always stick with me; "take care of your patients as though they were your family, and the rest will take care of itself." He attributed that quote to our dear friend Dr. Gary Johnson (who our free extraction clinic is named after), who offered him that same advice when he was starting out on his own in Bloomington.

Steve also knew the value of family time. When I was younger and starting out, I was eager to help out in the OR if he had a hospital case, and he would always tell me; "don't worry about this, I got it, go home and be with your family."

He was more than a partner to me, he was family. We would go to Blackhawks games together, golf, and enjoy each others company at professional meetings. He will be terribly missed.
